

In pursuit of Economic Opportunity – A Year in Review

Community Futures Development Corporations (CFDCs) support community economic development by assisting Ontario's rural communities strengthen and diversify their economies. As a community-based non-profit organization, Essex CFDC is governed by a board of local volunteers and is staffed by experienced personnel who encourage entrepreneurship and the pursuit of economic opportunities.

Strategic Community Planning and Development

CFDCs work closely with communities to assess local challenges, explore new ideas and opportunities to help implement development strategies that could strengthen their economies. Essex CFDC provides service to Amherstburg, Essex, Kingsville, Lakeshore, LaSalle, Leamington, Pelee Island and Tecumseh.

Essex CFDC will begin work on its new Strategic Plan in the coming year. The five (5) pillars listed below, established in the 2008 – 2012 Strategic Plan, were its guiding principles over the past five years. This Plan was augmented in 2011 using the Windsor-Essex Regional Economic Roadmap and Strategic building blocks with emphasis on a Regional approach to economic development.

- ✓ Business Retention and Expansion
 - To enhance the success and growth of local business ventures
- ✓ Working Together Windsor-Essex
 - To take a leadership role in promoting collaboration
- √ Towism
 - To promote tourism in the county with a focus on regional/collaborative efforts
- ✓ Agri-Business
 - To enhance the development of agri-business and value-added ventures
- √ Higher Education, training, and skills development
 - To encourage the competitiveness of local workforce and business through higher levels of education and training

Community-Based Projects

CFDCs collaborate with a variety of partners from the public and private sectors to implement projects or special initiatives targeted to their local communities.

The Business Hub

In January 2013, the Windsor Essex Economic Development Corporation's Small Business Centre relocated their county satellite office to the Essex CFDC location. In addition, WEtech Alliance also colocated and opened their new Essex County satellite office staffed on a part time basis. The integration of these services aims to create a central hub to benefit entrepreneurs, start-up businesses and small business owners with programs and resources.

The following are highlights of some Economic Development initiatives that Essex CFDC participated in and/or provided resources to in fiscal year 2012-2013:

Breakfast Express Club

Several networking sessions were again held for entrepreneurs in the County last year. This collaborative effort between the Essex CFDC, the Small Business Centre and the Self Employment Assistance Office began in 2005. It is a valuable venue for small business owners to practise their networking skills and develop contacts and partnerships.



Culture Task Force

Essex CFDC is a member of the Windsor-Essex Prosperity Council (WE PROSPER), a collaborative effort of local organizations to promote regional prosperity. In the past year, Essex CFDC completed its year of Chairing the Culture Task Force and a report was presented to the WE PROSPER council.

Entrepreneurship Task Force

Essex CFDC is also a member of the WE PROSPER Entrepreneur Task Force. This task force's goal is to increase economic growth by supporting small business and entrepreneurship development initiatives.

* The Essex Train Show

Sponsored South Western Ontario's largest train show held in Essex. It was a historic year with the last train to come through Essex earlier in the year.

Junior Achievement of South Western Ontario

Subsidized a portion of the cost for the grade 7 – Dollars with Sense and the Grade 8 – Economics for Success Programs.

❖ Kingsville BIA

Contributed to the Kingsville BIA's "Operation Face Lift Phase II" project. Following the success of the 2008 campaign, the second phase was launched. This allowed Essex CFDC to offer micro loans to Kingsville businesses who wanted to participate in the façade initiative but did not have the matching funds to leverage their application request.

Business Services and Access to Capital \$

Business Services

CFDCs understand small businesses and the local marketplace providing important services to businesses, entrepreneurs, and social enterprises including:

- Business advice, counselling, information and referrals
- Guidance with business plans
- Entrepreneurial training
- □ Information on relevant federal and provincial programs and services

Small Business Loans

CFDCs also administer local investment funds to help finance new or existing small businesses for start-up, expansion or stabilization plans that help maintain or create jobs. Repayable financing of up to \$150,000 on commercial terms through loans, loan guarantees or equity investments is available when financing from other sources is insufficient. All CFDC financing decisions are made at the community level by the local Board



of Directors. The local Board can also make loans up to \$250,000 on an exceptional basis.
